*Preface*

Dear Friends,

Hello everyone. I am writing this as May is not living up to its expectations, being wet and chilly! I hope it improves for us all in June. May has been busy and exciting. For me the finding and purchasing of a house to become the Vicarage for All Saints Vendée is at the forefront of our minds and a lot of conversations. We held an Extraordinary General Meeting (a report of which is elsewhere) to give people the information and to answer as many questions as we could. Bob was at the house during the meeting, making plans. He had some visitors after the meeting ended! The house does need some work, but is fairly central and most importantly at a price the church could afford.

When we have completed the purchase we plan to hold an 'Open Afternoon' with tea, scones etc. available so that people can come and see it. As there is work to be done we will have a sheet, rather like a wedding present list, and there will be an opportunity for people to donate the money to buy a light switch, a tin of paint, a sheet of plaster board etc. The people of the Parish will really be part of this house!

We also held our Away Day in May, even if we only went as far as Mouilleron en Pareds! Martyn Compton led us through the day. We tried to discern God's will and plan for our future. We spent quite a lot of time in silent prayer followed by discussions in small groups and then shared our thoughts. I will endeavour to collate these responses and those of the questionnaire in the near future so that we can study the results. If you haven't returned your questionnaire please do so, it's not too late. Your opinions matter.

The Confirmation service at St Bartholomew's Church Dinard was very special and our prayers are with Anna and Thomas as they move forward in their walk with God. We all need at times to review our walk with God and ask ourselves the questions: 'Am I still listening to God?' 'Am I being obedient to Him?' 'What plans does He have for me now?'

The Holy Spirit is our helper in our lives with God, but He can be the most neglected of the Trinity. We have all been given the gift of the Holy Spirit as we will be reminded at Pentecost and we are all asked to bear the fruits of the Spirit in our lives. He hasn't stopped working just because 2,000 years have passed but for many people it is too overwhelming to let him move in their life. You can't keep God in a little box if the Holy Spirit is doing his work. God will still work miracles, He will still heal, He will answer prayer, although none of them may be in the way that we expect, but we have to be open to His actions.

I understand that people are wary of hysteria, of false claims, or lack of reverence but, just as some people will claim benefits they don't deserve, but we don't stop benefits, so we must still carry on trusting in God to help us discern what is God given and what is man made. The Holy Spirit is a wonderful gift from God so that He can live in us, let us not try to limit His works.

I won't be with you for Pentecost this year as I will be at Le Pas Opton, the Spring Harvest holiday camp, with Beccy for a holiday. This is a special week they do for those with disabilities and it is also rare that Beccy and I go on a 'proper' holiday together, usually she visits and we carry on with normal life, so it will be a real treat.



**Celia Houghton:** Celia is somewhat isolated in a care home in England but her family may soon be close by.



## Notes from our Church Wardens

*We are excited! This does not happen to us too often, but we have momentous news! All being well, All Saints, Vendée will shortly have its own vicarage!*

*Here is how it came about:*

*It is our responsibility to ensure that Caroline is housed appropriately. We had looked into buying a property, but with the average cost of a three bedroomed house being about 150,000 euros those at the Forum, following the AGM, felt it would be wrong to commit ASV to a mortgage for however many years. We therefore decided that the only thing to do was to find a house to rent. Renting a house is likely to be about 600 euros a month.*

*As we were looking at the list of rental houses. our eye was caught by another listing, a house to buy for 62,000 euros. At this point we should say that we were looking for a house between Chantonnay and Les Essarts and this one was listed as 'Axe Chantonnay/Les Essarts' - the exact words we had been using in our discussions. Although it seemed most unlikely to be suitable, we went along to have a look...*

*Caroline and Bob, Barbara and I, were all really taken with this house in St Vincent Sterlanges. Of course it needs work to turn it into appropriate accommodation, but Bob is willing to undertake this. When finished, the house will provide a large kitchen/ diner and sitting room on the ground floor and 2 large bedrooms with 'en suite', plus a study on the first floor. There is also a small front garden. In addition, across the road, there are 'dependances' containing a garage and two workshops, plus a 'potager', as well as a grassy area.*

*During the time we have been without a permanent priest, we have been raising money to help provide housing. We know that, as a Church, we can afford to buy this house, without a mortgage. Having been given the 'go ahead' by the Standing Committee of your Church Council, I am delighted to tell you that the vendors have agreed to sell us the property for 58,000 euros to include all fees and taxes.*

*It will mean that ASV will have its own official address and its own 'vicarage'. We can stop paying rent and Caroline and Bob can stop living out of suitcases and have somewhere in the Vendée that they can call their own.*

*While we can afford to buy the house, it will stretch us. We do need to keep some money in the accounts to pay for the costs of refurbishment of the house [currently estimated in the region of 10,000 euros], as well as the everyday expenses of running our Church.*

*We shall shortly be writing to members to ask if they are able to help out in the form of a donation or an interest free loan.*

*I hope you will feel as excited as we do to have our own central base and to know that we shall no longer have to pay rent...*

It is perhaps a pity to cease spreading this social side of our ministry, and also to lose the income generated from those outside our congregation. Therefore we write to find out if there would be support for a replacement event, from both the previous workers, and also from new members. As we have many people on holiday at the traditional Summer Fête time, people away in UK on half term "Grandparent- Duties" late October, and Christmas gets very hectic for many, we are proposing an Autumn Fair, possibly early in November.

## Letter from The Editor

### From dog roses to dog daisies and daisy dogs!

I love seeing the hedgerows at this time of year as I'm driving around. I look to see what fresh wonders the earth has produced. My eye was caught recently by trailing arms of wild pink roses. I love their beauty and simplicity. My mind went off into a reverie...how can we call these sweet flowers `dog roses`? Is it a term of disparagement? Are they unimportant when compared to the large, blousy, cultivated varieties? In olden days, the roots were used, apparently, to make a poultice to apply to wounds sustained from a rabid dog. So maybe this is the reason. My favourite, though, is the suggestion that the wild rose blooms when Sirius, the dog star, [part of Canis Major] is in the sky...



Appreciated throughout the centuries, this is the rose whose stylised form has been used in heraldry – the tudor rose, the white rose of York, the red of Lancaster... It beautifies the hedgerows right through until winter with its large glossy red fruits, the rosehips. Known as a wonderful source of vitamin C, the use of rosehips became especially prevalent during World War II, when children were encouraged to pick them so that they could be made into rose hip syrup. Indeed, I remember the local clinic supplying this for my children long afterwards.

But beware, if eaten raw, rosehips may cause mild nausea and sickness, along with pain and diarrhoea. However, it is said they may be used as a charm to attract health and wealth and rosehips placed beneath the pillow are said to protect the sleeper against nightmares and nasty spirits that seek to disturb the nightly peace!

[By the way, I just love this snippet which came to my attention. Apparently the phrase `sub-rosa` [under the rose] which means `in confidence or secret` comes from the Roman fashion of fastening roses to the ceiling in the rooms where meetings and parties etc were held. The roses meant that anything said or done in that room was secret and would remain so. This use has continued in a more stylized manner throughout the centuries and even today we still have plaster `ceiling roses` even though we have long forgotten the origin.]



Dog Daisies

Of course, it is not only wild **roses** that are referred to as `dog`, for, blooming abundantly beneath them at the moment are dog **daisies**, also known as ox-eye daisies or marguerites. These are not inferior daisies although they are very common! Indeed, they are the national flower of Latvia and of Central Finland. Did you know that the unopened flower buds can be marinated and used like capers? I'm not sure I would like to try this, though.

The age old test of whether your boyfriend loved you: `He loves me, he loves me not, he loves me...` as you pull off the petals one by one, is a lot easier with this large daisy!

But please don't get confused between a dog daisy and a daisy dog! Yes, there is such a breed. It is a cross between a Bichon Frise, a Poodle and a Shih-Tzu. Very pretty! Just don't ask me how it got its name!
