Forethought

The sun is shining as I sit here wondering what to write, though there was a hard frost this morning, the sky is clear, and the birds are singing. Having just returned from a family visit to the UK, the washing line is full so there will be ironing to do in the next few days. Not, you understand, that I'm at all domesticated, just running out of clean clothes. But it is better to be prepared. It's the same I suppose with Lent. By the time you read this, we will have had our service of penitence on Ash Wednesday, a time of preparation, some of you will have already determined what you're going to "give up" during Lent. I try to do the opposite and set myself a challenge each year to read a chapter of a Gospel a day. Then to set aside time for reflection on that chapter and the message of it. For me this is always difficult, life throws up so many distractions, always far more interesting than what I **should** be doing.

In the liturgy for Ash Wednesday the phrase "Remember you are dust, and to dust you will return. Repent of your sins and turn to Christ" is used as the anointing with Ashes takes place. The reference to dust comes from the story of the creation, Genesis 2. Verse 7.

When Jesus said "Repent," He was talking about a change of heart toward sin, the world, and God; an inner change that gives rise to new ways of living that exalt Christ and give evidence of the truth of the gospel. In Matthew, Jesus says that church members should forgive each other "seventy times seven times" (18:22), a number that symbolizes boundlessness. We humans, too often, hold grudges against one another, sometimes for years. I often wonder why? Our time is finite, yet we squander it, festering inside over a hurt or perceived snub. Why? Let's use this Lenten Season to make ourselves right with others, and in so doing putting ourselves right with our Saviour and Redeemer.

through the Standing Order Scheme

ADVANTAGES

If you set up a standing order (virement) through your French bank, online, it is cost-free. If you need help doing this, please just ask me, or other council members.

You stay in total control of what you give – the standing order (virement) can be changed at any time, but only by you!

Only the treasurer knows how much you give per

You know what you are giving, and exactly when the money comes out of your account, and so your budgeting is much easier.

If you complete a French tax form, then you will get a rebate of 66% at the end of each financial year in which you have made a contribution. That means that a monthly virement of 30€ per month, will only cost you 10€ after tax. A monthly virement of 60€ will only cost you 20€ etc!

If your French tax bill is small, then you will pay no tax at all.

ASV can plan ahead much more effectively, as it knows what contributions are coming in, rather than guessing who is going be at church!

If you would like to physically put something into the collection plate each service, then there should be small cards which you can collect on your way into church, which you can put into the collection plate as it is passed round.

DISADVANTAGES:

I can't think of any, so why not come and join the party!

British residents:

If you do not have a French bank account, but would like to support the work of ASV on a regular basis, then please contact me, and I can help you. Please note, you cannot use tax-efficient giving in both France and the UK.

REVISION OF

THE ASV ELECTORAL ROLL

The Electoral Roll is essentially a "register" of all eligible members of the congregations of a church who then

have a right to attend the Annual Meeting, vote at this meeting for motions and elections, and stand for election to council or other offices. The number of people on the Electoral Roll also affects how many Council members can be elected at the Annual meeting. It is the duty of the Electoral Roll Officer to compile and revise the Roll and to maintain the confidentiality of the information - publishing only an "extract" when necessary.

There is a strict timetable for the annual revision based upon the date of the Annual Meeting which this year will take place on 26th April 2020. I am therefore required to revise the Roll no earlier than the 29th March and no later than the 12th April (Easter Sunday). Once the revision has been made the Roll is "frozen" until after the Annual Meeting. If anyone wishes to be added (or removed) from the ASV Roll please contact me as soon as possible.



ASV Council Secretary and Diocesan Synod Representative

I came to the UK aged six, after early years spent in India and Africa. When my father was unexpectedly transferred by his company back to London in the late 1950s, our family settled on Romney Marsh in Kent. Here I joined a church choir (6d a week and 1s for weddings!), and travelled for an hour and a half each way by taxi and bus to grammar school in Ashford.

After A-Levels I spent a year working with a family of professional opera singers in Munich, Germany, before doing a teacher's course in dance, drama and PE at Chelsea College Eastbourne. This included a fascinating year spent at the Laban

Art of Movement Studio, where I made friends with students from Belgium, Holland, Japan and Australia. I then worked as a summer-school tennis coach at SES (The School of English Studies) in Folkestone, followed by further training in TEFL (Teaching English as a Foreign Language), after which SES offered me a full-time TEFL post, which involved teaching a range of adult students from all over the world.

In 1977, I moved to Northampton, in order to complete my probationary school-teaching qualification. I joined the staff of a large comprehensive, teaching dance, drama and PE. In 1980, keen to go travelling, I got a job at a Christian International School in Japan. However, the start date was postponed at the last minute. Finding myself with a 'free' year, I took a Certificate of Theology at St John's College, Nottingham, instead. At the end of the year, I applied for a job as the administrator of a recently renovated city centre church in Durham.

My role at St Nicholas was to oversee the use of the building (open daily from 9.00am-5.00pm) and to assist with the running of Kairos, a dance-drama group which, alongside the church's talented team of musicians, performed at evangelistic events throughout the region. Situated in Durham's historic marketplace, St Nic's had been redesigned to enable its use not only as a place of worship, but also as a resource for the local community. The pews had been removed and replaced by chairs, the floor carpeted and heated, making available a beautiful space for use throughout the week by the town's church and community groups, as well as providing a corner for a small but thriving FairTrade shop. Encouraged to consider 'ministry' to be the heart of my administrative role, a major part of my job also involved the training and management of a team of volunteer 'manners', who were available to welcome the flow of visitors (tourists, students, homeless etc.) coming into the building to seek advice and/or pastoral counselling.

I'm absolutely delighted I went to Durham as it was here, in 1983, that I met David! Following our marriage at St Nic's in 1984, and a one-year secretarial course at New College of Further Education, I then joined the Durham Probation Service to work on an innovative apology and reparation scheme, mediating between young offenders and the victims of their crimes.

Our son James was born in 1988, after which I returned to teaching EFL and ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages), initially as a volunteer and then as an associate lecturer at New College Durham. I followed this by working as a freelance presenter of 'brain-friendly' language teaching workshops for TEFL conferences in Greece, Spain, Holland and Argentina.

In 1998, I started ministry training at Cranmer Theological College, a path which eventually led me back into the world of education, albeit this time primarily in a welfare capacity. As an EWO (Education Welfare Officer) I gained insights into the poverty afflicting many children and families in certain parts of the North East. I worked with mainstream secondary, primary and special school teachers and pupils, plus staff in multiple agencies (such as police, judicial and social services), across a wide area of the county. My final post in Durham was as a teacher with the local authority's specialist outreach service, liaising between children, families, schools and psychological services, and overseeing a team of classroom assistants who supported children with social, emotional and behavioural difficulties in mainstream primary education.

Since moving to France with David and James in 2007, I've run 'brain-friendly' summer-schools and taught English classes in two Lycées, a 'Centre de Formation', and to adults in evening groups. David and I volunteer in arts, human rights and refugee aid associations, have taken part in bilingual literary festivals, chorales, bonsai groups, and a range of EU literary projects. We have also joined an inspirational writer's group, and are now on new 'career' paths as aspiring writers. Retirement six years ago has brought particular joy, enabling David and I not only to be free to travel widely to see our son (who works as a journalist and now lives with his Korean wife in the Far East), but also to further develop and hone our writing skills.

Throughout our twelve years in France, David and I have felt deeply blessed to be part of the sociable, prayerful, English-speaking fellowship of All Saints Vendée — a welcome bastion of Christian worship, love and hope in a rapidly changing and increasingly divided world.

Past Times - Hannah Street, Porth

Porth in English means gateway and following the name it is the starting point of the Rhondda Fach and Fawr valleys.

I grew up just a short distance from Hannah street and in those days, you could purchase just about everything that you needed. Indeed, one of my Friday errands was to go to Hannah street to the local florist Jean Pothecary who also doubled as a florist and to collect Hake which was shipped overnight from

Grimsby by rail and collected at the station at the top of Hannah street. There was no meat in our house on Fridays.

Porth was a mining community and Hannah Street had some Italian cafes and whose owners came from Bardi in northern Italy to 'service' the needs of the miners. Indeed, they covered the working hours of the miners.

We then witnessed the growth of the Catholic Church and it was somewhat strange when in school to listen to the children of the Italians speaking Italian with a Welsh accent.

The second world war reflected the fact that we were at war with the Italians and it is a fact that lots of the fathers of my friends were taken to near Bridgend and interned in prison.

Hannah Street from 1910.
All the chapels were built by miners out of local stone.
The Chapel is first on the right.

Today Porth still has many descendants of the original Italian settlers.

Hannah Street housed about three or four Chapels all built by the miners out of local stone. Then Wales until the 1960's was 'dry' on Sunday and the chapels were filled three times during the day and for a youngster it was rather frightening to hear the resounding performances of the Baritones in the delivery of Cwm Rhondda which translated means the Rhondda Valley.

Then on Sundays it was a meeting around the family bible and then walking to Chapel and in one's best Sunday clothing.

Later, on Sunday the girls and boys in their best clothes used to walk through Hannah Street with the girls on one side and the boys on another. Whilst called for whatever reason 'The chicken walk' it was absolutely innocent and it followed the habits of our parents.
